A Big Thank You!

On 25th October around 50 members and others attended an event at Chatham Historic Dockyard to celebrate the part played by many people from far and wide who have contributed to the restoration of GKE 68. The Dockyard granted use of the Royal Dockyard church for a brief welcome from our President David Swan and me. A short presentation of the bus's history followed, beginning from a new vehicle entering public service, through Contractors' transport, the Brian Smith phase, followed by lengthy dormancy (mostly outdoors), leading at last to restoration. There followed a trip to Aylesford by Nu-Venture's Chatham & District Tribute Bus to view the (almost...!) restored bus itself, moved outside for the occasion. Some seats had been installed with some volunteer input - thanks are due to Wendy and Malcolm for co-ordinating the exercise and the supply of parts.

"Heritage Place" progress

Medway has been named by The National Lottery Heritage Fund as one of their 9 places of focus, together benefitting from £200M over 10 years as part of the Heritage Places Initiative. This has enabled the council to start work on developing a heritage strategy for Medway. They are currently researching and mapping local assets, identifying groups and providing support in developing funding bids. Discussions to date are supportive of Friends of Chatham Traction but as yet not promoting an acknowledgement of transport and industrial heritage as a critical part of Medway's heritage. We will continue to develop partnerships with other groups and press to include a transport heritage feature as part of any long term ambitions. Our contact at the Council is Imogen Robertson, Strategic Programmes manager.

At the same time NLHF are supporting us in developing a bid for funding for development and delivery of initial activity to establish the Medway Heritage Bus, to include personnel and resources to boost our capacity, driver training, new website, archiving knowledge, storage facilities, educational resources, interpretation material, pilot projects for community use etc.

And the Bus...?

SE Coachworks have completed the work on the cab sliding windows (thanks Bradley!). It involved fitting some seals to the emergency window on the left side of the cab. (This is so named as it provides a means of escape for the driver in the event that the cab door cannot be opened.) Also, making and fitting the small sliding window in the lower part of the cab door.



This seemed to have long vanished from GKE, but Chris Gibbons pointed out that FKO 223, with its Weymann body contemporary with GKE, still had one. So photos were taken and passed on to SEC.

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There are still things to sort out. Ian has prepared for re-installation the fuse and switch panel that lives in the cab above the emergency window, and has now turned his attention to the interior lights. There are 25 of these, plus the odd one over the platform. Once these are sorted and installed the wiring can be connected.

We are still short of the full complement of saloon light glass shades and bell push-buttons. BAE Systems, who have included us in their funding of local community organisations, offered technical assistance in recreating these items. However this has withered somewhat following an enthusiastic start in mid-2022, almost certainly because of BAE's services being required for other purposes just now. So we may have to go searching once more.

One last thing worthy of mention is N-V's donation of some destination blind rollers which the bus has long been without.
